

## ⑤ Mother Studies



- I used soft pastel to do this artwork. I found this media very difficult, as the details are very difficult to show using soft pastel.




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### MARK POWELL

# PREP4

-Weaving activities has begun since long ago. This can be seen from ancient houses where their houses have bamboo weaved walls. The weaving ropes are made from natural materials such as the fibres found in making of weaving craft that has been due to traditional effort since ages ago. This basic plants material grows wildly in the forest, swamps, villages and near the beach area.

Various types of crafts can be produced through the weaving process and technique from the pandan and pine plants. Weaving shapes are made based on the function such as baskets, hats, food covers, mats and various shapes used.

Other than two-dimensional shape, there is a three-dimensional shape weaving.

This type of weaving is usually used by old people to fill or keep living necessities and every day usage such as baskets and sacks.

I decided to do a project on the talented handwoven and decided to experiment this weaving technique to experiment with different textures.

I picked up a weaving technique to simulate woven textures. I chose a green and yellow color and a blue and yellow color and a blue and white color. I painted it with acrylic paint.

My grandmother hands I used dry media of pen or watercolor base and pencil on watercolor base. Her bracelets are colour pencil with white poster paint for highlights.




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For my sister's hands, I used tempera paint and using rough strokes. I used the point to differentiate between darker and lighter shade and placed it on. I tried to not blend the paint together to show the strokes.



I experimented with contrasting effect on both hands. My grandmother's hands I used colour pencil on white paper to show a realistic effect. While I used watercolor base and dark hands to show contrast lines. Contrast between real life and abstract. I used watercolor and oil pastel on the hand base to signify old age and older generation, and die-harder, but the younger.



My mother's hands I used watercolor for this whole piece, and oilcolor pencil for the fingernails.

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


I used watercolour base and colored pencil as the medium used for colouring. I used black pens to outline the prominent lines and poster paint for the background and shirt.

I attempted to copy the style of the artist in this piece. The background is a brown pencil paper. On top painted the face in a brown monochrome and added flower like the ones in the title. This whole piece is in watercolour and poster colour.

I used a watery watercolour base with different random colours. Then used Chinese ink to point on the details.

Titled Andy Warhol's artwork, "Marilyn Monroe, 1967," to experiment with pop colour and to incorporate this in this overlapping portrait of the three of them. I personally found this style out of my comfort zone and found it difficult to experiment with this style, due to my love for more realistic artworks.



I used random bright poster colour like green, blue, yellow, brown, red, pink, etc. for my base. Then I used a black gel pen to outline the lines on their faces and shirts. I used various marker pens ranging from Sharpies to Belfa Permanent markers to add Andy Warhol's style into the piece. I used red, green, purple, orange, blue, etc. markers to use on their faces and fingernails. I used dark green, blue, red and brown to add shadows to their shirts and neck. Overall, I struggled through this piece as I was constantly out of my comfort zone.

ANDY WARHOL (1928-1987)

-Andy Warhol's flamboyant lifestyle became as celebrated as his artwork. The quintessential Pop artist, wouldn't have surprised his own notorious declaration that every person would at some point be famous for 15 minutes. Although he was an extremely prolific artist, his silk screens of Campbell's soup cans and multiple Marilyn Monroe headshots became his signature work.

**ANURENDRA JEGADEVA**


